1. Absentee Auction

The items in this sale will be sold via absentee auction, closing date: November 14, 2012, 11:00 p.m., EST.

2. Our Guarantee Regarding Descriptions

American Glass Gallery has made every attempt to describe correctly the property being sold. Descriptions are guaranteed to be accurate as regards authenticity, age, condition, and measurements to within one-fourth inch, as represented in this catalog. In describing damage, exterior wear or manufacturer's flaws that in our opinion, do not significantly detract visually or monetarily from the value of the item are not listed and will not be considered for refund. The Auctioneers reserve the right to make verbal corrections and provide additional information at any time during the sale.

3. Preview

Items may be viewed by appointment from November 1, 2012 through November 12, 2012.

4. Bidding Procedure

You may submit your bids by mail, phone, FAX, email or through our on-line auction site. If bidding by mail or FAX, please fill out the absentee form and return it to us. Your bid, either written or oral, grants American Glass Gallery the authority to protect you up to the amount of your stated bid. Your bid will not be removed once executed.

Bidding Times: You can submit your bids anytime after receiving your catalog. Bids may be made by phone, daily, until closing day, November 14, 2012, from 9 A.M. - 7 P.M. Eastern Time. Incoming phone bids will be accepted on the closing day (November 14, 2012) until 11 P.M. Eastern Time. Phone calls and Fax bids after this time will not be honored. No exceptions. You may also place your bids through our on-line auction service 24-hours a day once the site has opened for bidding, on or about November 1, 2012, continuing until 11:00 P.M. Eastern Time, November 14, 2012.

Please do not wait until the last day or two of the sale to place your

bids! Because many collectors wait until the final few days of the sale to place their bids, we anticipate the telephone and internet bidding to be very busy during that period, so please plan accordingly. In the event of a tie bid, the earliest received bid on the lot will take precedent. We would welcome your bids by phone so that we can answer any questions and assist you in your bidding.

You may also telephone us at any time during the auction, prior to the closing of the sale, to check the status of your bids, to find the current bidding level, to open a bid, or to raise a bid on an auction lot.

Bidding Increments are as follows:

Bids submitted between the above increments, whether by mail, FAX, email or on-line via the internet, will automatically be lowered to the closest lower increment.

This is a minimum bid auction. Bids below the printed minimum will not be accepted.

An example of how our absentee bidding system works: You bid \$600.00 on a lot which is the highest bid received to date. The second highest bid is \$450.00. The current high bid level would be yours at \$475.00, one bid increment higher than the other collector's bid. Any additional bids submitted by others below \$600.00 will automatically be topped on your behalf by a representative of American Glass Gallery, up to your stipulated high bid amount. If no further bids on this lot are received beyond the \$450.00, and the under bidder has not requested a "Call Back", then you would have won the lot at \$475.00, not the \$600.00 that you were prepared to pay.

American Glass Gallery will at NO TIME disclose bids pledged by others; only the current "High Bid" level of a lot will be stated upon request. The highest bidder as determined by American Glass Gallery shall be the purchaser. It is the sole right of the auctioneer to settle any dispute between bidders and to regulate the bidding procedure. The auctioneer reserves the right to refuse any bid he believes not to have been made in good faith.

5. "Call Back" Process

If requested, the three top bidders of an item at the time of closing will be given a "Call Back" over the next number of days in order to resolve the final sale of an item. You can request this service by "checking" the appropriate box on your absentee bid form or verbal agreement by phone. It is the responsibility of the bidder to insure he has qualified for this service.

Please note: No "Call Backs" will be executed for bids under \$400.00. In the event of tie bids, the earliest bid received will be the winning bid.

An example of how the "Call Back" process works: As an example, you have bid \$600.00 on a particular lot. Another bidder has submitted a bid of \$900.00 on the same lot. Assuming that as of the auction closing date you are among the top three bidders on this lot and you have requested a "Call Back", you would receive a call informing you that you have been "Out Bid" and the current "High Bid" is now at \$650.00. If you choose to continue bidding on this lot, you may now do so. Assuming that you now increase your bid to \$700.00, we would accept your bid but also inform you that we have a higher bid on this lot and must bid \$750.00. At this time, an auction between you and American Glass Gallery, representing the collector who submitted the bid of \$900.00, takes place. This bidding would continue until you drop out, or top the other bidders high bid of \$900.00. If the other bidder has not requested a "Call Back" service, you would be awarded the lot. If however, the other bidder also requested a Call Back, we must now call them. If they elect to increase their bid over your high bid, we would in turn call you back. This back and fourth process would continue until one of the bidders declines to go any farther.

If you have requested a "Call Back", the auctioneers will need to contact you on the days immediately following the auction closing between the hours of 8 A.M. and 9 P.M. Eastern Time. Please supply us with all appropriate contact phone numbers including, home, mobile and work numbers. Bidders must provide the appropriate telephone numbers where they can be contacted. If you will be traveling or otherwise unavailable, bidders with "Call Back" privileges will have the responsibility to contact American Glass Gallery twice daily during the Call Back period.

Please note, every effort will be made to contact you during the "Call Back" period. However, the bidder will forfeit their rights to a "Call Back" if the auctioneers are unable to reach them. American Glass Gallery reserves the right to discontinue Call Backs on any item in the sale (2) two days after the closing date of the sale. At that time, the current "High Bidder" may be awarded the item even if Call Backs are still outstanding.

6. Terms

Successful Bidders, Prompt and full payment is due immediately upon receipt of our invoice. Absolutely no exceptions. Anyone failing to pay for items won will forfeit all rights to bid in any future American Glass Gallery sales. Any late or delayed payments may result in loss of return privileges for items purchased in the sale.

No Items Will Be Mailed Before Full Payment Is Received.

Buyer Premium: A 12% buyer's premium will be added to the hammer price (15% if paying by Credit Card or PayPal), to be paid by the buyer as part of the purchase price. For example, if you purchase a lot for \$100.00, you will receive an invoice for \$112.00 if paying by cash, check or money order, plus any applicable sales tax or shipping charges.

Taxes: If you are a Michigan resident, a 6% sales tax will be added to your bill unless you have a valid resale number registered with us.

Shipping: Shipping, handling and insurance are extra. We ship insured via U.S. Mail. These charges will be added to your bill unless the lots are picked up in person. Our charges for shipping (excluding foreign shipments and oversized lots) are \$18.00 for the first item, \$9.00 for each additional item together with extra insurance costs (we use current U.S.Postal Service insurance rates).

Please allow two to four weeks for delivery after receipt of your check.

Payment: American Glass Gallery accepts Cash, Money Orders, Personal Checks, Visa, MasterCard, American Express and PayPal. If paying by Credit Card or PayPal, an additional 3% will be added to the invoice total.



7. Refunds

Refunds will be given at the discretion of the Auctioneers. Items purchased must be examined and request for refund made immediately upon receipt of the item or items. Since opinions can differ, particularly in the matter of condition, the Auctioneers will be the sole judge in the consideration of refunds. Refunds requested on the grounds of authenticity must be made within 15 days of the date of the auction, and such refund requests must be accompanied by at least one supporting statement in writing from an authority recognized by the Auctioneers. It is the Auctioneers sincere intention to consider any reasonable request for a refund. Absolutely no returns for any reason after 30 days of the closing of the sale.

(Detail taken in natural daylight) The "W. Wolf" figural blue barrel is certainly one of the most important bottles known from the Pittsburgh area. It is considered by many to be among the top whiskey bottles and would likely be a shoe-in on almost anyone's "most desirable barrel" list. This is only the second example that has come to light; the first was sold in the legendary Gardner auction more than 35 years ago in 1975. In addition, from discussions with Pittsburgh-area collectors, not even shards of this bottle have been discovered in the more than 40 years of digging the Pittsburgh area.

WESTERN SPICE MILLS. 7th Street, between Gratiot and Chouteau Avenu NORRIS & GARESCHE, Proprietors.

Lot 59: Extremely Rare Western Spice Mills Peppersauce

n 1860, John P. Norris and Fred L. Garesche, were the proprietors of Western Spice Mills. This business was located on 7th Street, between Gratiot and Chouteau Avenue, in St. Louis, Missouri, and was celebrated for its fancy spices and assorted food products. Today, although their names may have been relegated to the history books, their bottles have become legendary with collectors.

The landmark book on food bottles, *Ketchup, Pickles, Sauces, 19th Century Food in Glass*, (Zumwalt, 1980), pictured a broken aquamarine example of the Western Spice Mills peppersauce bottle, on page 435. As noted by Zumwalt, a small cache of these extremely rare bottles were discovered during the 1968 and 1969 excavations of the steamship Bertrand. The Bertrand sank on April 1st 1865, when it struck a snag in the Missouri River, near De Soto Landing in the Nebraska Territory.

Subsequently, another small store of these extremely rare bottles were discovered during the excavations of the Steamship Arabia. This sidewheeler sank just north of Kansas City, on September 5, 1856. Some of these amazing bottles can be viewed at the historic Steamship Arabia Museum in Kansas Ciy, Missouri.

The examples discovered in the recovery efforts of the two aforementioned steamships range in colors from almost yellow to amber and aquamarine. Today, there remains but a small handful of these beautiful bottles, outside of museums, in private collections. This prized example is certainly considered to be one of the finest in terms of color, condition and eye appeal!

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Lot 57: Rare & Important Josee Johnson Jar


isted as No. 1033.8, on page 414 of the encyclopedic *The Standard Fruit Jar Reference*, (McCann, 2011), the "Notes" state, "This half gallon example has one of the most bizarre closure arrangements of any of the patented fruit jars."

This interesting jar, patented May 16, 1865 (patent number 47,731), remains the only example known to date. It has been in a private collection in western New York State and has never been offered for sale until now.

The rather complicated closure arrangement which essentially consists of a wooden frame was apparently intended to serve several purposes, including to facilitate stacking, prevent damage or breakage of the fragile glass jar, and of course, to form a secure closure.

As an interesting sidebar, the wooden frame appears to be made from American chestnut. Today, it is pretty much an extinct species; early on, it was a fairly common wood used for crates and packing.

Fine and Colorful American

hese attractive, distinctive bottles, prevalent during the mid-1800s, were one of the last bastions of what was a once very manual process of finishing a freeblown or even mold-blown bottle. Handled pieces rose to fashion predominantly as containers for various types of spirits, however, they can occasionally be found on other types of bottles as well.

In some cases, the addition of the handle created what collectors today would term a "whimsy," an off-hand or fanciful piece not meant for mass production. This was generally done by the gaffer at the end of the day, oftentimes to either show his skill, or to create a personalized object for himself or family. In the majority of cases however, the handled bottles were production items created to serve both utilitarian and decorative purposes.

When one considers the process of creating the handle, attaching it, and often tooling the lower curl, it obviously added several steps to the production of each piece. It necessitated a higher degree of skill on the part of the glassblower and added valuable time to the production of each bottle. This extra time and expense would have undoubtedly been passed along to the merchant which helps to explain their relative scarcity and why they likely fell out of favor. An interesting grouping of handled spirits type bottles is shown on plate 48, of *American Bottle & Flasks and Their Ancestry*, (McKearin & Wilson); see pages 194 and 195.

Today, these handled containers make a very attractive and interesting category. Many of them are still quite affordable and represent a good value for the collector. When you combine the various handle treatments (plain, "strap" or flat band, curled, tooled rigaree, etc.), with the varying shapes and sizes of bottles to which they were attached, and the almost endless color variations, it creates a very pleasing and spectacular array of bottles.

"Washington" / Bust of Washington – "Baltimore Glass Works" / Monument Historical Flask.

Baltimore Glass Works, Baltimore, MD, 1830 - 1845. Brilliant medium to deep aqua, sheared mouth - blowpipe pontil scar, pint, very near mint; (a 1/2" wide, possibly in-manufacture, flake from the pontil extends to the base edge on the reverse, otherwise attic mint). GI-18. A great example, clean, bright, with virtually no high point wear and with exceptionally strong embossing!

"Lafayette" / Bust of Lafayette / "T.S." – Masonic Historical Flask, Coventry Glass Works, Coventry, CT

1824 - 1826. Bright, clear medium olive, sheared mouth - pontil scar, 1/2 pint, virtually pristine perfect; (two tiny, onionskin-thin open bubbles at corrugated edge, otherwise "out-ofthe-mold" perfect). GI-84. Extremely rare. A bright, bubbly, exceptional example with a very strong impression. Ex. Blaske, Spiller, Noordsy and Fuss collections.

Medium olive amber, sheared mouth - pontil scar, pint; (a small "star" type crack at the side with several 1/8" radiations and two 3/8" fissures extending from it; a 1" annealing line or fissure in the neck, and some interior residue that would likely easily wash out). GI-80. With a little cleaning, this attractive example would display near mint!

Bust of Byron - Bust of Scott Portrait Flask, probably an early Stoddard glasshouse, Stoddard, New Hampshire, 1842 – 1850. A nice, bright, attractive example of this classic early Stoddard glasshouse flask.



GII-11a. An extremely rare mold, delicate, early, and a great example with a good mold impression!

Eagle – Eagle Historical Flask, Louisville Glassworks, Louisville, Kentucky, 1855 – 1860. Brilliant medium to deep blue green, more of a bluish or teal tone than most, applied ring type collared mouth with lower bevel - large blowpipe pontil scar, Qt; (other than a tiny, less than pinhead bit of roughness on one of the heavy vertical ribs, it is absolutely "out of the mold" pristine perfect). GII-31. Exceptional condition, color and clarity. Ex. Sandor Fuss collection.

Eagle / "Louisville Ky / Glass Works" Historical Flask, Louisville Glassworks, Louisville, Kentucky, 1855 - 1865. GII-36.

GII-60. A very attractive, scarce and popular little flask, great condition, good rich color.

GII-63. A nice example that was likely a "barn find."

A good clean example that is lacking the typical high point wear often encountered on these flasks.

American Ink Bottles

ne would be hard-pressed to find an antique bottle collecting category with as much diversity of size, form, color, and charm as that of ink bottles. Add to that the relative abundance of desirable examples, with new ones surfacing regularly, and you'll have a lifetime of collecting possibilities.

Next to bottles that were made to hold beverages, ink bottles were probably one of the most common articles of glass in everyday use since the late 18th century. They were likely blown at the vast majority of America's early glasshouses as there was always a need, regardless of region. Those that are considered most desirable and collectible today would have been made up to the last quarter of the 19th century.

Early American ink bottles can be free-blown, pattern-molded, blown 3-mold (such as Lots 74 & 75), as well as in full-size, 2-part molds. Colors are even more diverse, with nearly the entire spectrum being well represented.

While aqua and shades of amber and olive predominate, blues, greens and yellows can be found and occasionally the ever-desirable puce and violet shades.

Because of all this diversity, the ink category has been popular with collectors for a long time and many choose to specialize in a single sub-category such as "Pitkin-types," 3-mold, umbrellas or the larger master ink bottles.

Attribution of ink bottles to any particular glasshouse is problematic, save perhaps some of the 3-mold geometric types. For the most part, the same forms were produced in their given period throughout the east, and later, over much of the United States.



Shoe blacking was probably first manufactured and bottled for commercial sale sometime in the mid 18th century. The earliest mention of its sale in this country comes from a William Tweedy of Newport, Rhode Island, who in 1764 advertised his *"fine liquid shoe blacking much in use* for leather bottoms of chairs" in a local newspaper.

The bottles that were used to contain liquid blacking were generally cylindrical or square, of slender proportions, and holding four to six ounces. They were either free-blown or blown in full-size, 2-part molds. Few of them were embossed, most having a only a paper label. Just a handful these labeled examples have survived to this day.

While not a particularly diverse group with regard to colors, early blacking bottles are often crude, with lots of character and charm.
